

At George Brown, we understand that learning is a life-long endeavour, and we will be here to help facilitate that learning.



GEORGE BROWN COLLEGE'S MASS-TIMBER BUILDING

CONSTRUCTION IS UNDERWAY ON Limberlost Place, is the latest addition to George Brown College's Waterfront Campus. Our mass timber, net zero carbon emissions project will be the first institutional building of its kind in Ontario, Limberlost Place will welcome students in January 2025.





A MASS-TIMBER BUILDING WITH LOCAL & GLOBAL IMPACT

A GLOBAL MODEL OF MASS-TIMBER CONSTRUCTION

George Brown College's commitment to the development of Toronto's East Bayfront community continues with Limberlost Place, a 10-storey building currently under construction at Queens Quay East and Dockside Drive.

Limberlost Place is years ahead of Toronto's 2030 goals for sustainable design and performance for new developments, and it has become a global model for mass timber sustainable construction. Built with made-in-Canada mass-timber components, the design provides generous spaces focused on wellbeing by maximizing access to natural light and fresh air.

Students will learn *in* and *from* this flexible and future-proof facility, equipped with networked and adaptable smart building systems designed to adjust to changing academic uses.

JACK COCKWELL'S HISTORIC DONATION

WE ANNOUNCED THE BUILDING'S

name, inspired by the Limberlost Forest and Wildfire Reserve near Huntsville, Ontario, when Canadian business leader and philanthropist Jack Cockwell donated \$10 million to George Brown College for the Limberlost Place project in 2021. This donation was in addition to his earlier gift of \$8 million in 2015. The \$18-million gift is one of the most significant donations made to the College.

THE BROOKFIELD SUSTAINABILITY INSTITUITE (BSI) at Limberlost Place will focus on aligning digital transformation and sustainability to benefit communities everywhere, becoming a beacon for "smart sustainability." CELEBRATING ALUMNI SUCCESS



CHRIS CAMPBELL



Chris Campbell, George Brown Carpentry Apprentice making a difference in the community

CARPENTER, UNION LEADER AND EOUITY, **DIVERSITY** and inclusion champion Chris Campbell is passionate about helping others succeed in the skilled trades. When he delivered a keynote address at a 2022 George Brown College convocation ceremony, he shared a Maya Angelou guote that guides his efforts. "When you learn, teach. When you get, give." Campbell is a proud graduate of George Brown's Carpentry Apprentice program and the Director of Diversity, Inclusion and Equity for the Carpenters' Regional Council. He travels across the province to talk to industry reps, visit job sites, and connect young people to meaningful career options. Campbell is also Vice-President of the Toronto Carpenter's Union, Local 27.

"From Thunder Bay to Sarnia, you can't assume that things are the way they are in Toronto. So I go to each community, engage people and listen to what they're saying," he says, all with the goal of increasing diversity in the field and promoting inclusive hiring practices and industry policies.

CONNECTING YOUTH TO OPPORTUNITIES IN THE SKILLED TRADES

For more than two decades, Campbell has been laser focused on connecting Black and Indigenous youth and youth from other diverse communities to opportunities in the skilled trades. He meets with young people at their places of worship, community centres, and other social hubs.

Following transit expansion and other development announcements in Toronto, he worked with developers to ensure they provided employment opportunities for young people from the surrounding areas. This work laid the foundation for the Toronto Community Benefits Network, of which he is now Chair of the Board of Directors.

Campbell sits on several other construction industry and community boards and committees, including the George Brown College Foundation Board of Directors, the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists and the Toronto Police Black Community Consultative Committee. He also volunteers for The Children's Breakfast Clubs.

ADDRESSING RACISM ON JOB SITES

When asked about the working environment for Black people in the trades, Campbell admits it wasn't great when he was coming up, but positive changes are happening — changes he is helping to push forward.

"When I reflect, I say, yeah, that happened to me, but I was too driven by wanting to make something of myself that I didn't pay much attention to it at the time," he said. "I can remember some of the conversations, word for word."

When questioned by the media or anyone else about racism on the job, Campbell says he speaks openly and honestly about the issues.

"I tell both sides, the good and the bad, the challenges and the success."

WORK THAT RESONATES WITH NEW TRADESPEOPLE

The advice, support and straight talk Campbell provides have meant a lot to many. He said he often receives emails and phone calls from people he has helped get work in the skilled trades.

"Earlier in my career, there were a lot of Caribbean folks, but today it's more international. You have people from Africa, Asia, and all over the world," he said. "So, it tells me that maybe what I did and said resonated with them."

JULIA HUYNH



Alum Mentor Julia Huynh Aims to Help International Business Students Overcome Challenges

JULIA HUYNH HAD ALREADY completed a law degree in Vietnam when she decided to pursue her dream of studying abroad and finding a career that aligned more with her passions. After a successful journey at George Brown College pursuing marketing and an interest in mental health advocacy, she's now giving back as an alumni mentor to current students through the Centre for Business' <u>Student-Alumni</u> <u>Mentorship Program.</u>

"I received a lot of support and guidance from the College, especially the academic advisors and Student Association, which helped me take my first step toward a successful career. Now I want to give back and help other international students who may be facing similar challenges I did," said Huynh, referencing language barriers, financial struggles and entering the Canadian job market, all of which can take a toll on a student's mental health.

Back in Vietnam, Huynh had been looking to explore her full potential. She heard that George Brown College has a reputation as a leading educational institution among Vietnamese students, as well as the competitive advantage of gaining practical work experience in addition to education.

When she arrived in Canada, Huynh's path led to class leadership roles, being on the Dean's List and graduating with honours, already having received a job offer from the wholesale supply company she worked at for her co-op program. Now she works as a freelance digital marketer and is preparing for permanent residency alongside acting as a mentor.

PROVIDING CAREER GUIDANCE

For Huynh, mentoring is more than just advising on necessary marketing skills. What excites her the most is guiding her mentees in choosing the right career path and helping them discover their passion for their profession. Additionally, she also emphasizes the development of important soft skills such as time management, problem-solving, critical thinking and teamwork.

"I feel proud and honoured to have the opportunity to give back to the community," said Huynh. "Returning to George Brown College to assist students, especially international students, is a refreshing experience for me. I am delighted to learn from the vision of the Mentorship Program and find it fulfilling to live and work with a sense of purpose."

As for advice to students, Huynh recommends that they make the most of their time in college because it's an investment for their future, and remember to prioritize their well-being.

"Living abroad can be stressful at times, but there are resources available on campus to help students cope with these challenges," said Huynh. "Don't hesitate to reach out and seek support when you need it. You're not alone in this journey. With hard work, dedication and a positive mindset, you can achieve your goals towards your future career."

Clairoux's description on the TTC's website says the piece "reminds many Indigenous peoples to walk in a good way or live in that good way."

"As for what this means to me, it's a huge accomplishment," she says. "When I was growing up, not a lot of people believed in me and I didn't believe in myself. It is so validating to have been chosen to share my art with such a large audience." Clairoux makes jewellery, tote bags and other items featuring her art, which her TTC profile says is inspired by her "community and teachings she's picked up along the way." KEVIN BUCK AND DARRYL SHOTLANDER

From George Brown College to Michelin Stardom: How Alumni Foster Culinary Success Worldwide

AT GEORGE BROWN COLLEGE, students benefit from an extensive network of fellow alumni—both in and out of the classroom. As a recent graduate of the college's <u>Italian</u> <u>Culinary Arts postgraduate program</u>, Darryl Shotlander has experienced firsthand the life-changing perks of tapping into the strong network of mentorship and support the college offers.

As part of his postgraduate program, Shotlander (pictured chef on the left) had the incredible opportunity to complete a threemonth internship at a restaurant in Italy. After expressing his dream of working at the famed three-Michelin-star restaurant Osteria Francescana to his professor and program coordinator Chef Dario Tomaselli, Tomaselli reached out to George Brown alum and chef Allen Huynh—who just so happened to be working in the kitchen at the acclaimed Massimo Bottura restaurant in Modena, Italy.

The plan was set in motion, and Shotlander packed his bags for Italy to embark on the beginning of his culinary journey overseas.

"Chef Alan was a fantastic mentor and taught me to take a creative and narrative approach to preparing food," Shotlander says, as he reflects back on the profound experience of working at one of the world's best restaurants. "The way he coached me changed my whole career trajectory and how I think about food."

After completing his internship in Italy and graduating from the program, Shotlander knew he wanted to continue pursuing his career abroad, and he had his eyes set on the thriving culinary scene in London. Chef Tomaselli again jumped at the opportunity to

help Shotlander achieve his goals, connecting him with Kevin Buck, also an alum of the Italian program and of the Culinary Management program, who currently works as a sous-chef at Above at HIDE another esteemed Michelin-rated restaurant.

Hearing the high praise from Chef Tomaselli and knowing that Shotlander had received the same level of guidance and mentorship from George Brown's faculty that he had experienced, Buck (pictured chef on the right) felt it was an easy decision to extend the new grad an invitation to come to London and do a trial shift at his restaurant.

Shotlander is grateful for the advice and support he's received from Chef Buck in the lead-up to London, as he navigates the possibility of moving and working abroad.

"Kevin has been so helpful in guiding me through this process of essentially immigrating to a new country, especially since he's gone through it himself," Shotlander says. "He doesn't even know me, apart from a few video calls, so what he's doing for me is amazing."

Buck, whose experience since graduating has included competing in the prestigious culinary competition Bocuse d'Or and working at the three-Michelinstar Frantzén in Sweden, credits his impressive trajectory to his education at George Brown.

"Each place that I've worked has taught me something new," he says, "but it was my time at GBC that laid the foundation for me to become successful in this industry."

Buck also won the 2023 Chef of the Year award from the British Culinary Federation. He was among 14 finalists vying for the top prize on June 12 at the University College of Birmingham's Competition Kitchen.

Chefs Buck and Shotlander have shown, it's clear George Brown's alumni network is much more than a list of names—it's a culture of support and collaboration, reminding students that education extends well beyond the school walls.

For current George Brown culinary students who wish to emulate Buck's success, he emphasizes that networking is the secret ingredient to following in his footsteps.




Student Success Story – Your Support Makes an Impact!

and hard work that no one else sees, as well as minimizing the financial burden of tuition."


